

hen Jesus and his disciples had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, 'The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately." This took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet, saying, "Tell the daughter of Zion, Look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey." The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them.

A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting,

"Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!"




The Crucifer and Torch Bearers Lead the Congregation into the Church.



WEDNESDAYS AT ST. MARY'S AND THE ORIGINS OF HOLY WEEK

This timely excerpt from a Wednesday morning 7:00 a.m. Eucharist homily by an attendee is just one example of how this service, held most Wednesdays throughout the year in our chapel, can enrich your faith and inform your life as a Christian: "In the early church, people were baptized only on Easter. After weeks of rigorous instruction, the catechumens (all adults) recited the local creed from memory on Holy Saturday, prayed throughout the Paschal Vigil of Saturday night, and were baptized at dawn Easter morning. In the mid-fourth century, Bishop Cyril of Jerusalem codified this process in his eighteen Catechetical Lectures. Cyril probably instituted the observances of Palm Sunday and Holy Week as practical steps to organize the devotions of pilgrims around the sacred sites of Jerusalem. One particular Iberian pilgrim produced a body of writing, eventually collected as The Pilgrimage of Egeria, which provided a practical guide to Cyril's catechistic teachings and Holy Week rituals. Egeria was the first to describe the procession of palms, Easter Vigil, and veneration of the cross. Through Egeria's

writings, Cyril's liturgical practices in
Jerusalem, particularly during Holy Week,
became the norm of the emerging church.
Today, those ancient traditions remain
profoundly imbedded within our Book of
Common Prayer and Holy Week practices."
Come to church on Wednesday mornings and
start your day off in a prayerful and enriching
way.
