John 11:32-44

The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to John.

When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who came with her also weeping, he was greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved. He said, "Where have you laid him?" But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?"
