

The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Luke. *Glory to you, Lord Christ.*



The Great Thanksgiving






In the fullness of time bring us, with the ever-blessed Virgin Mary, and all your saints, from every tribe and language and people and nation, to feast at the banquet prepared from the foundation of the world. Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever. *AMEN*.
