SECOND READING

A reading from the words of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. from the Birmingham Jail:

Was not Jesus an extremist for love: "Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which spitefully use you, and persecute you." Was not Amos an extremist for justice: "Let justice roll down like waters and righteousness like an ever flowing stream." Was not Paul an extremist for the Christian gospel: "I bear in my body the marks of the Lord Jesus." Was not Martin Luther an extremist: "Here I stand; I cannot do otherwise, so help me God." And John Bunyan: "I will stay in jail to the end of my days before I make a butchery of my conscience." And

Abraham Lincoln: "This nation cannot survive half slave and half free." And Thomas Jefferson: "We hold these truths to be self evident, that all men are created equal . . ." So the question is not whether we will be extremists, but what kind of extremists we will be. Will we be extremists for hate or for love? Will we be extremists for the preservation of injustice or for the extension of justice? In that dramatic scene on Calvary's hill three men were crucified.

We must never forget that all three were crucified for the same crime-- the crime of extremism. Two were

extremists for immorality, and thus fell below their environment. The other, Jesus Christ, was an extremist for love, truth and goodness, and

thereby rose above his environment. Perhaps the South, the nation and the world are in dire need of creative extremists.

THE HOLY GOSPEL

John 2:1-11

Response after the Deacon introduces the Gospel **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. He said

to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now." Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant,

which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People **Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.**

The Celebrant continues....

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **Amen.**

HONORING

DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.

Today we honor Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. at our services, hearing his words in our second reading and his aspirations in our prayers of intercession. Since 1986, the United States has celebrated King's birthday, January 15, as a national holiday. The Episcopal Church recognizes Dr. King as a martyr and, like other martyrs designated by the Church, we commemorate them on the day of death. In the case of Dr. King, our Church's liturgical calendar allows us the flexibility to celebrate his legacy on (or near) his birthday or on the anniversary of his death, which is April 4.

As one of the greatest American civil rights leaders, Dr. King had a dream of a world that offered justice to all. During his lifetime, he labored mightily to bring that dream to reality and to liberate a people he saw as still shackled 100 years after their legal deliverance. Like the prophets of the Hebrew bible, like the threat Jesus posed to the governments of his day, and like those who continue to boldly expose and fight injustices throughout the world, Dr. King was seen by some as a threat to the

structures that impose oppression of others and suffocate basic human rights. God asks us to dream dreams for ourselves and for others and also to have mercy on the merciless. When we fulfill this desire, we will join Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. in worshiping God on the mountaintop. During this holiday weekend please remember those whose voices continue to go unheard. -Natalie Hala, *parish liturgist*

ST. MARY MAGDALENE SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The St. Mary Magdalene Scholarship Fund was created by a generous bequest of a long-time parishioner of St. Mary the Virgin. The gift of \$1 million is to endow a fund to be used for college scholarships for young women from the parish.

The principal of the fund is to remain in perpetuity with the income each year being used for scholarships. This is the third year of scholarship awards. We anticipate that approximately \$40,000 will be available for distribution among the applicants.

Scholarships will be available to young women attending college for the 2019-2020 school year. Young women from St. Mary the Virgin who are entering college or continuing their college education in the fall of 2019 are eligible to apply.

In keeping with the terms of the bequest, the criteria for the awards will include such factors as participation and involvement at St. Mary's over the years, academic merit and achievement including outside activities while in high school and college, and need.

The recipients will be selected by the Rector upon the recommendation of the Vestry, with input from the youth group leaders, Sunday school director and youth acolyte coordinator who have worked with these young women over the years.

There are 2 application forms which can be found on the St. Mary's website—one form for new applicants and one form for "repeat" applicants who received scholarships last year. In order for the selection committee to determine financial

need, a copy of the parents' latest filed Form 1040 (summary pages) will be due along with the application.

Applications will be due March 1, 2019.
